February 14, 2006

- A comprehensive conservation strategy is required by law to qualify for State Wildlife Grant Program funding
- Up to \$1 million per year to the Department
- First strategy approved in 2006
- Second plan approved in 2017
- Next revision due October 1, 2025

- 5. Monitoring Plan for SGCN and their habitats

- 7. Coordinate with agencies and tribes that manage significant land areas
- 8. Public participation









