## **OPERATION PLAN**

Sandoval County is very rural in nature, and is one of the largest Counties in New Mexico. The vast size and rural nature of the County provide many opportunities for illegal activities, including off-road parties with underage drinking, drug use and drug distribution, off-road unlicensed facilities, among many others. These challenges present themselves primarily in the summer and early fall months of the year, and especially on the weekends.

The Sheriff's Office routinely patrols areas that are hot spots of illegal activities, such as trail heads, mountainous, hard to access areas in northern Sandoval County (near Jemez Springs and Cuba), the Cibola and Santa Fe forests, the "sand dunes" area in far southwestern Sandoval county, and arroyos across the County.

To provide additional patrol and enforcement in these problem locations, the Sandoval County Sheriff's Department will select 10 areas for special OHV operations during the summer and early fall months of 2023 – July through October.

Each operation will involve four deputy sheriffs at an average O/T cost of \$--/hr/deputy sheriff. Each operation will take approximately six hours to conduct, which includes one hour of planning and logistics prior to the operation, four hours for the actual operation, and one hour of wrap-up and debriefing afterwards.

The cost per each operation is as follows:
