Agenda Title:	Proposed changes to pronghorn hunts in northeastern New Mexico		

1. Summary of Agenda Item

The Department will provide the Commission with information regarding a decrese in pronghorn licenses in some GMUs in the Northeast for the 2025-2026 license year.

2. Background Information

For many years, pronghorn populations in northeastern NM have been robust with healthy adult and fawn survival. However, the last 4 years of aerial surveys have suggested a trend in decreased fawn and adult female survival. Together, these two metrics drive population productivity for all big game species, including pronghorn. Beginning in the 2025-2026 license year, the Department will eliminate all female – immature male public draw and over the counter pronghorn licenses from GMUs 41, 47, 56, 57, 58, and 59 and reduce other hunts in GMUs 41, 42, 47, 56, 57, 58, and 59 by 20%. This includes instituting a limit on over-the-counter private land licenses. The license adjustment is allowed under 19.31.15.8: *"The director, with the verbal concurrence of the chairperson of the New Mexico state game comission or their designee, may adjust the number of licenses, or authorizations for pronghorn up or down to address significant changes in population levels or to address critical department management needs. This adjustment may be applied to any or all of the specific hunt codes for pronghorn, and may include a limit to the number of private land-only licenses by hunt code."*

Some members of the public, including landowners, have independently reached out to the Department with concerns over the pronghorn population in the Northeast.
