

**STATE GAME COMMISSION MEETING AND RULE MAKING NOTICE**

The New Mexico State Game Commission ("Commission") has scheduled a regular meeting and rule hearing for Friday, November 30, 2018, beginning at 9:00 a.m. at the Roswell Convention and Civic Center, 912 N. Main St, Roswell, NM 88201, to hear and consider action as appropriate on the following: Presentation of proposed changes to the Deer rule.

**Synopsis:**

The proposal is to adopt a new Deer rule, 19.31.13 NMAC, which will become effective April 1, 2019. The current Deer rule is set to expire on March 31, 2019.

The proposed new rule adjusts seasons for calendar date shifts. It also adjusts draw license numbers based on biological data and management goals. Archery season is divided into a separate September and a separate January season when a split September and/or January season currently exists. Several new hunting opportunities have been created, including additional archery hunts in the Northeast and Northwest Areas. Most youth hunts are standardized to a nine day hunt surrounding Thanksgiving week. Comments are due by 5:00 p.m. on November 28, 2018. The final proposed rule will be voted on by the Commission during a public meeting on November 30, 2018. **TITLE 19 NATURAL RESOURCES AND WILDLIFE**  
**CHAPTER 31 HUNTING AND FISHING**  
**PART 13 DEER**

**19.31.13.1 ISSUING AGENCY:** New Mexico department of game and fish.  
[19.31.13.1 NMAC - Rp, 19.31.13.1 NMAC, 4-1-19]

**19.31.13.2 SCOPE:** Sportspersons interested in deer management and deer hunting. Additional requirements may be found in Chapter 17, NMSA 1978, and Chapters 30, 31, 32 and 33 of Title 19 NMAC.

**19.31.13.3 STATUTORY AUTHORITY:** 17-1-14 and 17-1-26 NMSA 1978 provide that the New Mexico state game commission has the authority to establish rules and regulations that it may deem necessary to carry out the purpose of Chapter 17 NMSA 1978 and all other acts pertaining to protected mammals, birds and fish.

**19.31.13.4 DURATION:** April 1, 2019 through March 31, 2023.

**19.31.13.5 EFFECTIVE DATE:** April 1, 2019, unless a later date is cited at the end of an individual section.

**19.31.13.6 OBJECTIVE:** Establishing open hunting seasons and regulation, rules, and procedures governing the distribution and issuance of deer licenses by the department.

**19.31.13.7 DEFINITIONS:**

- A. "Antlerless deer" or "A"** shall mean a deer without antlers.
- B. "Deer"** as used herein, shall mean any wild cervid of the genus *Odocoileus*.
- C. "Deer enhancement program"** as used herein, shall mean the department activity that allows the issuance of not more than two permits for the taking of one fork antlered deer per permit, with the purpose of raising funds for programs and projects to benefit deer.
- D. "Department"** shall mean the New Mexico department of game and fish.
- E. "Director"** shall mean the director of the New Mexico department of game and fish.
- F. "Either sex" or "ES"** shall mean any one deer.
- G. "Either sex white-tailed deer" or "ESWTD"** shall mean any one white-tailed deer (*Odocoileus virginianus*).
- H. "Fork antlered deer" or "FAD"** shall mean a deer possessing antlers, one of which shall have a definite fork showing two or more distinct points. A burr at the base does not constitute a point or fork.
- I. "Fork antlered mule deer" or "FAMD"** shall mean a mule deer (*Odocoileus hemionus*) possessing antlers, one of which shall have a definite fork showing two or more distinct points. A burr at the base does not constitute a point or fork.
- J. "Fork antlered white-tailed deer" or "FAWTD"** shall mean a white-tailed deer (*Odocoileus virginianus*) possessing antlers, one of which shall have a definite fork showing two or more distinct points. A burr at the base does not constitute a point or fork.
- K. "Game management unit" or "GMU"** shall mean those areas as described in 19.30.4 NMAC, Boundary Descriptions for Game Management Units.
- L. "High demand hunt"** shall mean a special draw hunt where the total number of non-resident applicants for a deer hunt exceeds twenty-two percent of the total applicants based on data for the two immediately preceding years.
- M. "Private land-only deer license"** shall mean the valid official document for hunting deer on private deeded land during designated private land-only hunts.
- N. "Quality hunt"** shall mean a hunt designed to provide a hunter with an opportunity to achieve one or more of the following: an enhanced experience based on timing and length of hunt season; lower hunter density; or an increased opportunity for success.



O. "Web sale" shall refer to accessing the department's internet address to initiate the process to purchase specific deer hunting licenses as designated by the director annually.

P. "Wildlife management areas" or "WMAs" shall mean those areas as described in 19.34.5 NMAC Wildlife Management Areas.

**19.31.13.8 ADJUSTMENT OF LICENSES, PERMITS AND AUTHORIZATIONS:** The director, with the verbal concurrence of the chairperson or their designee, may adjust the number of licenses, permits, or authorizations for deer up or down by no more than twenty percent of the total licenses available in the GMU to address significant changes in population levels or to address critical department management needs. This adjustment may be applied to any or all of the specific hunt codes for deer. The director may change or cancel all hunts on military lands to accommodate closures on those lands; if changed, the season length and bag limit shall remain the same as assigned on the original hunt code.

**19.31.13.9 GMUs 2A, 2B, 2C, 4 AND 5A PRIVATE LAND-ONLY HUNTS:**

A. Persons applying for private land-only deer licenses in GMUs 2A, 2B, 2C, 4 and 5A must do so on a special application form that may only be obtained from landowners in these GMUs.

B. GMU 2A, 2B, 2C, 4 and 5A landowners are required to provide proof of land ownership to obtain special application forms from the department.

C. For GMU 5A, the department may use input from landowners to develop a process to distribute special application forms to private landowners that provides reasonable and equitable participation opportunities for landowners.

D. When applying for private land hunts in GMU 5A, no more than one person may apply on each application form.

**19.31.13.10 CHRONIC WASTING DISEASE:** The director has the authority to designate possession criteria to any deer hunter where chronic wasting disease (CWD) is a concern. It is unlawful to transport dead deer, or their parts, taken from any GMU or area identified by the director in which the presence of, or possibility of, exposure to CWD has been identified to any location outside that GMU except for the following:

A. meat that is cut and wrapped (either commercially or privately);

B. quarters or other portions of meat with no part of the spinal column or head attached;

C. meat that has been boned out;

D. hides with no heads attached;

E. clean skull plates with antlers attached; clean is defined as having been immersed in a bath of at least one part chlorine bleach and two parts water with no meat or tissue attached;

F. antlers with no meat or tissue attached;

G. finished taxidermied heads;

H. or by prior arrangement to a department office.

**19.31.13.11 QUALITY DEER HUNTS:** Quality hunts for deer are as follows:

A. the third any legal sporting arms hunt in GMU 2B;

B. the January bow hunts in GMU 2B;

C. all hunts in GMU 2C;

D. all hunts in GMU 5B;

E. all hunts in the Burro mountains hunt area in GMU 23 as defined in 19.30.4 NMAC;

F. all hunts in GMUs 17, 27, 33 and 41;

G. all hunts in the Valle Vidal;

H. all private land deer incentive program hunts;

I. the November bow hunt in Sugarite canyon state park; and

J. all hunts on the Humphries/Rio Chama/Sargent WMAs.

**19.31.13.12 SPECIAL DEER HUNTING OPPORTUNITIES:**

**A. Deer enhancement program:**

(1) **Program description:** The director of the department shall collect all proceeds generated through the auction and lottery of special deer permits, and such monies shall be deposited in the game protection fund. These monies shall be made available for expenditure by the department solely for programs and projects to benefit deer and for direct costs incurred in carrying out these programs. These monies shall be used to augment, and not replace, monies appropriated from existing funds available to the department for the conservation, restoration, utilization and management of deer.

(2) **Requirements for issuance of special deer permits:**

(a) The state game commission shall authorize the director of the department to issue not more than two special deer permits in any one license year to take one fork antlered deer per permit. The director shall allow the sale of one permit through auction to the highest bidder and one permit to a person selected through a random drawing of a lottery ticket by the department or an incorporated, nonprofit organization dedicated to the conservation of deer.

(b) Unless their hunting privileges have been revoked pursuant to law, any person is eligible to submit a bid for the special deer auction permit or purchase lottery tickets in an attempt to be selected for the special deer lottery permit.

(c) The special deer permits issued through auction and lottery may be transferred through sale, barter or gift by the successful individuals to only other individuals qualified to hunt.

(3) **Enhancement hunts:** Deer enhancement licenses shall be valid from September 1 through January 31, for any legal sporting arms. These licenses shall be valid statewide where hunting is allowed. The bag limit shall be one fork antlered deer. The authorization to obtain a deer enhancement license may be used either by the applicant or any individual.

**B. Deer incentive programs:**

(1) **Chronic wasting disease (CWD) reporting incentive:** The director may annually allow up to two deer authorizations to be issued through a random drawing for deer and elk hunters submitting their legally harvested animal for CWD testing. Authorizations awarded pursuant to this rule may be transferred through sale, barter or gift. Deer incentive hunts shall be valid only for the dates, legal sporting arms, bag limit and area specified by the director.

(2) **Private land deer incentive program:** Private landowners who are conducting and maintaining substantial habitat improvements or land management practices on their deeded lands that directly and significantly benefit deer may be considered for special recognition. Only those projects as determined by the department to be relevant and beneficial to deer will be considered. Landowners must submit an application and once approved, develop a deer conservation and management plan in cooperation with the department. Upon approval of the plan the landowner may be granted alternative season dates as approved by the department. Landowners receiving incentive authorizations are required to submit an update as directed by the department to be considered for continued participation. The hunt code for any unique hunt season approved pursuant to this program shall be DER-1-600.

**C. Premium hunt opportunity:** One premium deer draw hunt will be issued each license year through the draw. The hunt area will be statewide on any public land open to hunting, including WMAs, and private land with written permission.

**19.31.13.13 POPULATION MANAGEMENT HUNTS:**

**A.** The director or their designee may authorize population management hunts for deer when justified in writing by department personnel.

**B.** The director or their designee shall designate the legal sporting arms, season dates, season lengths, bag limits, hunt boundaries, specific requirements or restrictions, and number of licenses to be issued.

**C.** In the event that an applicant is not able to hunt on the dates specified, the applicant's name shall be moved to the bottom of the list and another applicant may be contacted for the hunt.

**D.** In those instances where a population management hunt is warranted on deeded private lands, the landowner may suggest eligible hunters of their choice by submitting a list of prospective hunters' names to the



department for licensing consideration. No more than one-half of the total number of licenses authorized shall be available to landowner identified hunters. The balance of prospective hunters shall be identified by the department. [19.31.13.14 NMAC - Rp, 19.31.13.13 NMAC, 4-1-19]

**19.31.13.14 DEER HUNTS:**

A. Public draw (and private lands in GMUs 2A, 2B, 2C, 4 and 5A) deer hunts, listing the open GMUs or areas, eligibility requirements or restrictions, hunt dates, hunt codes, legal sporting arms, number of licenses and bag limit shall be as indicated below. The state game commission owned prairie-chicken areas shall be open for deer hunting during established seasons. Hunters holding a valid bow deer license for GMUs 23 or 24 who did not harvest a deer during their hunt will be allowed to hunt for antlerless deer within the Silver City deer management area as delineated by the department from January 16 through February 5.

**N. J.** **“FAWTD” or “forked antlered white-tailed deer” “Fork antlered white-tailed deer” or “FAWTD”** shall mean a white-tailed deer (*Odocoileus virginianus*) possessing antlers, one of which shall have a definite fork showing two or more distinct points. A burr at the base does not constitute a point or fork.

**O. K.** **“Game management unit” or “GMU”** shall mean those areas as described in **the state game commission’s rule 19.30.4 NMAC, Boundary Descriptions for Game Management Units.**

**P. L.** **“High demand hunt” is hereby defined as shall mean** a special draw hunt where the total number of non-resident applicants for a deer hunt **in each unit** exceeds twenty-two percent of the total applicants based **upon on** data for the two immediately preceding years.

**Q.** **“License year”** shall mean the period from April 1 through March 31.

**R.** **“Modern firearms”** shall mean center fire firearms, not to include any fully automatic firearms. Legal shotguns shall be only those shotguns capable of being fired from the shoulder.

**S.** **“Muzzle-loader” or “muzzle-loading firearms”** shall mean those rifles and shotguns in which the charge and projectile are loaded through the muzzle. Only black powder, Pyrodex or equivalent black powder substitute may be used. Use of smokeless powder is prohibited. Legal muzzle loader shotguns shall be only those shotguns capable of being fired from the shoulder.

**T. M.** **“Private land-only deer license”** shall mean the valid official document for hunting deer on private deeded land **during designated private land-only hunts during designated private land-only hunts.** This license shall entitle the holder to hunt deer only on private deeded land and only for the sporting arms type, hunt period, and GMU for which it is validated.

**U.** **“Public draw license”** shall mean the valid official document awarded through a public drawing for hunting deer. This valid official license shall entitle the holder to hunt where hunter numbers are limited by rule.

**V. N.** **“Quality hunt” is hereby defined as shall mean** a hunt designed to provide a hunter with an opportunity to achieve one or more of the following: **a potential harvest from a wider selection of buck deer, an pleasurable enhanced** experience based upon timing and length of hunt season; lower hunter density; and **or an** increased opportunity for success.

**W.** **“Restricted muzzle-loading rifle”** shall mean any muzzle loading rifle using open sights, black powder or equivalent and firing a traditional lead bullet. The use of in-line ignition, scopes, pelleted powder, smokeless powder and sabots, including powerbelt type projectiles, are prohibited.

**X.** **“TBD” or “to be determined”** shall mean the details of hunt dates or hunt areas will be provided by the department to the hunter when the designated population management hunt is initiated.

**Y.** **“Unlimited”** shall mean there is no set limit on the number of licenses established for the described hunt areas.

**Z. O.** **“Web sale” or “web site”** shall refer to accessing the department’s internet address **to initiate the process to purchase specific deer hunting licenses as designated by the director annually.**

**AA P.** **“Wildlife management areas” or “WMAs”** shall mean those areas as described in **the state game commission’s rule 19.34.5 NMAC Wildlife Management Areas.**

**BB.** **“ESWTD” or “either sex white-tailed deer”** shall mean any one white-tailed deer. [19.31.13.7 NMAC - Rp, 19.31.13.7 NMAC,]

**19.31.13.8 ADJUSTMENT OF LICENSES, PERMITS AND AUTHORIZATIONS AND HARVEST**

**LIMITS:** The director, with the verbal concurrence of the **chairman chairperson** or their designee, may adjust the number of licenses, **permits,** or authorizations **certificates for deer** up or down by no more than twenty percent of the total licenses available in the GMU to address significant changes in population levels or to address critical department management needs. This adjustment may be applied to any or all of the specific hunt codes for deer. **The director may change or cancel all hunts on military lands to accommodate closures on those lands; if changed, the season length and bag limit shall remain the same as assigned on the original hunt code.**

**19.31.13.9 DEER LICENSE APPLICATION REQUIREMENTS AND RESTRICTIONS GMUs 2A, 2B, 2C, 4 AND 5A PRIVATE LAND-ONLY HUNTS:**

**A. Restrictions:** Private land-only deer licenses shall not be valid on wildlife management areas or for private land hunts in GMUs 2A, 2B, 2C, 4 or 5A.

**B. Change of validation:** No one other than a department representative may change the hunt code validation marked on any deer license. Such changes must be made on the face of the license using the director’s approved procedures. No changes to the hunt code may be made after the start of the first deer season for which the license is validated. Licenses issued through the draw system are not eligible for validation changes.



**C. One deer license per year:** It shall be unlawful for anyone to hold more than one license to hunt deer during the current license year unless otherwise specifically allowed by rule.

**D. Validity of license:** All deer licenses shall be valid only for the specified dates, eligibility requirements or restrictions, legal sporting arms, bag limit, and area specified by the hunt code printed on the license including those areas designated as public or private land per a current unitization agreement between the department and U. S. bureau of land management, state land office or other public land holding entity. Over the counter licenses shall be valid only for the specified dates, eligibility requirements or restrictions, legal sporting arms, bag limit, and area specified by rule or regulation. Except that a license will be valid on the contiguous deeded land of private property that extends into an adjacent GMU that is open to hunting for deer. This exception shall only apply when the adjacent unit has the same restrictions as to sporting arms type, bag limit, season dates and license availability.

**E. Deer hunts:** It shall be unlawful for any person:

(1) to hunt with any sporting arms type other than that for which his or her deer license is validated;

(2) to hunt during any season other than that for which his or her deer license is validated;

(3) to hunt in any GMU other than that for which his or her deer license is validated;

(4) to hunt deer on public land in any GMU with a private land only deer license, unless otherwise specifically allowed by rule;

(5) to knowingly hunt private property without possessing a valid deer license; or

(6) to hunt with any license issued originally to another person, except as specifically allowed by rule or law.

**F. Mobility impaired (MI) deer hunts:** It shall be unlawful for anyone to apply for a mobility impaired (MI) deer license, except as allowed by 19.31.3.11 NMAC.

**G. Youth only (YO) deer hunts:** It shall be unlawful for anyone to apply for a youth only (YO) deer license except as allowed by 19.31.3.11 NMAC.

**H. Military only deer hunts:** It shall be unlawful for anyone to apply for a military only (military only) deer license except as allowed by 19.31.3.11 NMAC.

**I. GMUs 2A, 2B, 2C, 4 and 5A private land only hunts:**

(1) **A.** Persons applying for private land-only deer licenses in GMUs 2A, 2B, 2C, 4 and 5A must do so on a special application form that may only be obtained from landowners in these GMUs.

(2) **B.** GMU 2A, 2B, 2C, 4 and 5A landowners may be are required to provide proof of land ownership to obtain special application forms from the department's northwest area office in Albuquerque.

(3) **C.** For GMU 5A, the department may use input from landowners to develop a process to distribute special application forms to private landowners that provides reasonable and equitable participation opportunities for landowners.

(4) **D.** When applying for private land hunts in GMU 5A, no more than one person may apply on each application form.

#### **19.31.13.10 DEER MANNER AND METHOD REQUIREMENTS AND RESTRICTIONS:**

**A. Season and hours:** Deer may be hunted or taken only during open seasons and only during the period from one half hour before sunrise to one half hour after sunset.

**B. Bag limit:** It is unlawful for any person to hunt for or take more than one deer during a current license year unless otherwise provided by regulation.

**C. Seizure:** Any conservation officer or other officer authorized to enforce game laws and regulations shall seize any deer carcasses that are improperly notched.

**D. Proof of sex:** It shall be unlawful for anyone to transport or possess the carcass of a deer without proof of sex. The antlers of any buck deer taken shall remain attached to the skull plate until arriving at a residence, taxidermist, meat processing place, or place of final storage. The scalp and both ears of female or immature male shall accompany the carcass in the same manner.

**E. Use of dogs in hunting:** It shall be unlawful to use dogs to hunt deer, except leashed dogs may be used to locate wounded or dead deer. Hunters must register with the appropriate department area office for the GMU they will be hunting before their hunt begins to use a dog in this manner.

**F. Use of baits or scents:** It shall be unlawful for anyone to take or attempt to take any deer by use of baits or scents as defined in 19.31.10.7 NMAC. Scent masking agents on one's person are allowed.



- G. **Live animals:** It shall be unlawful to use live animals as a blind or decoy in taking or attempting to take any deer.
- H. **Use of calling devices:** It shall be unlawful to use any electronically or mechanically recorded calling device in taking or attempting to take any deer.
- I. **Killing out of season:** It shall be unlawful to kill any deer out of deer hunting season.
- J. **Bullets:** It shall be unlawful to take or attempt to take deer by the use of tracer ammunition or any ammunition loaded with a full metal jacketed bullet. Only soft nosed or hollow pointed bullets may be used in hunting or taking deer.
- K. **Drugs and explosives:** It shall be unlawful to use any form of drug on an arrow or bolt or use arrows or bolts driven by explosives.
- L. **Legal sporting arms** for deer are as follows: any center fire rifle; any center fire handgun; shotguns not smaller than 28 gauge, firing a single slug; muzzle loading rifles; bows and arrows; and crossbows and bolts.
- M. **Areas closed to deer hunting:** The following areas shall remain closed to deer hunting, except as permitted by regulation: Sugarite canyon state park; Wild Rivers recreation area, the Taos valley overlook; all wildlife management areas; the Valle Vidal area; and sub-unit 6B (Valles Caldera national preserve). [19.31.13.10 NMAC - Rp, 19.31.13.10 NMAC, 4-1-15]

**19.31.13.11 10 DEER CHRONIC WASTING DISEASE CONTROL:** The director has the authority to designate possession criteria to any deer hunter where chronic wasting disease (CWD) is a concern. It shall be is unlawful to transport dead deer, or their parts, taken from any game management unit GMU or area identified by the director in which the presence of, or possibility of, exposure to chronic wasting disease CWD has been identified, to any location outside that game management unit GMU except for the following parts of deer:

- A. meat that is cut and wrapped (either commercially or privately);
- B. quarters or other portions of meat with no part of the spinal column or head attached;
- C. meat that has been boned out;
- D. hides with no heads attached;
- E. clean skull plates with antlers attached; clean is defined as having been immersed in a bath of at least one part chlorine bleach and two parts water with no meat or tissue attached;
- F. antlers with no meat or tissue attached;
- G. finished taxidermied heads;
- H. or by prior arrangement to a department office.

**19.31.13.12 11 DEER QUALITY DEER HUNTS:** Quality hunts for deer are as follows:

**19.31.13.13 12 SPECIAL DEER HUNTING OPPORTUNITIES:**

- A. **Deer habitat enhancement program:**
  - (1) **Program description:** The director of the department shall collect all proceeds generated through the auction and lottery of special deer permits, and such monies shall be deposited in the game protection fund. These monies shall be made available for expenditure by the department solely for programs and projects to



benefit deer and for direct costs appropriated from existing funds available to the department for the preservation, restoration, utilization, and management of deer incurred in carrying out these programs. Deer enhancement licenses or permits shall be valid from September 1 through January 31, for any legal sporting arms, for each license year. These licenses or permits shall be valid statewide, including department WMAs where hunting is allowed. The bag limit shall be one buck deer. The hunt code shall be DER-1-400. Licenses or permits may be used either by the applicant or any individual of the selected applicant's choice through sale, barter, or gift. These monies shall be used to augment, and not replace, monies appropriated from existing funds available to the department for the conservation, restoration, utilization and management of deer.

(2) **Requirements for issuance of special deer permits:**

(a) The state game commission shall authorize the director of the department to issue not more than two special deer permits in any one license year to take one buck fork antlered deer per permit. The director shall allow the sale of one permit through auction to the highest bidder and one permit to a person selected through a random drawing for the holder of a lottery ticket by the department or by an incorporated, nonprofit organization dedicated to the conservation of deer.

(b) Proposals for auctioning one special deer permit and the sale of lottery tickets to obtain one special deer permit through a random drawing shall be submitted to the director of the department prior to January 31, preceding the license year when the permit may be legally used.

(c) The proposals for auctioning the special deer permit and the sale of lottery tickets and subsequent selection of a recipient for a second permit through a random draw shall each contain and identify: (i) the name of the organization making the request as well as the names, addresses and telephone numbers of those members of the organization who are coordinating the proposal; (ii) the estimated amount of money to be raised and the rationale for that estimate; and (iii) a copy of the organization's articles of incorporation with a letter attesting that the organization has tax-exempt status. The letter must also affirm that the proponent agrees to the conditions set forth by the director of the department. The letter must be signed and dated by the president and secretary-treasurer, or their equivalents.

(d) The director of the department shall examine all proposals following the close of the application period. The director may reject any application which does not conform to the requirements of this section. In selecting a marketing organization, the director shall consider the qualifications of the organization as a fund raiser; the proposed fund raising plan; the fee charged by the marketing organization for promotional and administrative costs, relative to the funds obtained from auctioning the permit; and the organization's previous involvement with deer management and its conservation objectives. The director may accept any proposal when it is in the best interest of deer to do so.

(e) After a proposal has been approved, the state game commission shall establish open season dates, open areas, and license requirements.

(f) The marketing organization must agree in writing to the following: (i) to transfer all proceeds on or before the tenth day of the month following the auction and drawing for the lottery, and (ii) to provide the department with the names, addresses, and the physical descriptions of the individuals to whom the special deer permits are issued.

(g) The department and the marketing organization must agree to the arrangements for the deposit of the proceeds, payment for services rendered, the accounting procedures, and final audit.

(h) (b) Unless his or her their hunting privileges have been revoked pursuant to law, any resident of New Mexico, nonresident, or alien person is eligible to submit a bid for the special deer lottery auction permit or purchase lottery tickets in an attempt to be selected for the special deer lottery permit.

(i) (c) The special deer permits issued through auction and lottery may be transferred through sale, barter or gift by the successful individuals to only other individuals qualified to hunt.

(j) Special deer permits granted through auction or lottery, as described above, shall not be considered 'once in a lifetime' permits.

(3) **Enhancement hunts:** Deer enhancement licenses shall be valid from September 1 through January 31, for any legal sporting arms. These licenses shall be valid statewide where hunting is allowed. The bag limit shall be one fork antlered deer. The authorization to obtain a deer enhancement license may be used either by the applicant or any individual.

B. **Deer incentive programs:**

(1) **Chronic wasting disease (CWD) reporting incentive:** The director may annually allow up to two deer authorizations to be issued through a random drawing for deer and elk hunters submitting their legally harvested animal for CWD testing. Authorizations certificates awarded pursuant to this rule may be



transferred through sale, barter, or gift. Deer incentive hunts shall be valid only for the dates, legal sporting arms, bag limit, and area specified by the director.

(2) **Private land deer conservation incentive program:** Private landowners who are conducting significant habitat and management improvements on their deeded lands that significantly benefit deer may submit a deer conservation and management report, subject to review and approval by the department. Upon department approval of the report, the department may offer the landowner various incentives based on the degree of benefit to deer. The incentives may include extended or alternative season dates, or alternate bag limits as approved by the department. The hunt code for any unique hunt season approved pursuant to this program shall be DER-1-600. Private landowners who are conducting and maintaining substantial habitat improvements or land management practices on their deeded lands that directly and significantly benefit deer may be considered for special recognition. Only those projects as determined by the department to be relevant and beneficial to deer will be considered. Landowners must submit an application and once approved, develop a deer conservation and management plan in cooperation with the department. Upon approval of the plan the landowner may be granted alternative season dates as approved by the department. Landowners receiving incentive authorizations are required to submit an update as directed by the department to be considered for continued participation. The hunt code for any unique hunt season approved pursuant to this program shall be DER-1-600.

C. **Premium hunt opportunity:** One premium deer draw hunt will be issued each license year through the draw. The hunt area will be statewide on any public land open to hunting, including wildlife management areas, WMAs, and private land with written permission.

**19.31.13.14 13 DEER POPULATION MANAGEMENT HUNTS:**

A. The director or their designee may authorize population management hunts for deer when justified in writing by department personnel.

B. The director or their designee shall designate the legal sporting arms, season dates, season lengths, bag limits, hunt boundaries, specific requirements or restrictions, and number of licenses to be issued. No qualifying license holder shall take more than one deer per license year.

C. Applications must be submitted by the deadline date set by the department.

D. Applications for licenses may be rejected, and fees returned to an applicant, if such applications are not on the proper form or do not supply adequate information.

E. C. In the event that an applicant is not able to hunt on the dates specified, the applicant's name shall be moved to the bottom of the list and another applicant may be contacted for the hunt.

F. D. In those instances where a population management hunt is warranted on deeded private lands, the landowner may suggest eligible hunters of their choice by submitting a list of prospective hunters's names to the department for licensing consideration. No more than one-half of the total number of licenses authorized shall be available to landowner identified hunters. The balance of prospective hunters shall be identified by the department.

**19.31.13.15 14 DEER HUNTS:**

A. Public land draw (and private lands in GMUs 2A, 2B, 2C, 4 and 5A) deer hunts, listing the open GMUs or areas, eligibility requirements or restrictions, hunt dates, hunt codes, legal sporting arms type, number of licenses and bag limit shall be as indicated below. Military only hunters must be full time active military and proof of military status must accompany application or, if applying online, forwarded to the department by the application deadline date. Youth hunters must provide their hunter education certificate number on application. The Sandia ranger district of the Cibola national forest in GMU 14 is restricted to bows only. The state game commission owned lesser prairie-chicken areas shall be open for deer hunting during established seasons. Hunters holding a



valid **archery bow** deer license for GMUs 23 or 24 **and who** did not harvest a deer during their hunt will be allowed to hunt for antlerless deer within the Silver City deer management area as delineated by the department from January 16 through February 5.

B. **Private land-only deer hunts:** Private land-only deer licenses shall be restricted to the **season hunt** dates, eligibility requirements or restrictions, **sporting arms type**, **legal sporting arms** and bag limit that corresponds to the **public land draw** hunt code listed in **Subsection A of 19.31.13.15 14** NMAC for the GMU where the private landowner's property lies. Private land-only deer licenses shall be unlimited and available from any license vendor and the department's web site; **however, only one private land-only deer license will be issued.** Private land-only hunters in GMUs 2A, 2B, 2C, 4 and 5A must obtain a special application form from **the** landowner and apply through the draw. Private land-only hunts in GMUs 8, 46, 54, and 55 shall be as indicated below:

- F.**      **“Either sex” or “ES”** shall mean any one deer.

- H.**      **“Fork antlered deer” or “FAD”** shall mean a deer possessing antlers, one of which shall have a definite fork showing two or more distinct points. A burr at the base does not constitute a point or fork. †
- I.**      **“Fork antlered mule deer” or “FAMD”** shall mean a mule deer (*Odocoileus hemionus*) possessing antlers, one of which shall have a definite fork showing two or more distinct points. A burr at the base does not constitute a point or fork.
- J.**      **“Fork antlered white-tailed deer” or “FAWTD”** shall mean a white-tailed deer (*Odocoileus virginianus*) possessing antlers, one of which shall have a definite fork showing two or more distinct points. A burr at the base does not constitute a point or fork.
- K.**      **“Game management unit” or “GMU”** shall mean those areas as described in 19.30.4 NMAC, Boundary Descriptions for Game Management Units.
- L.**      **“High demand hunt”** shall mean a special draw hunt where the total number of non-resident applicants for a deer hunt exceeds twenty-two percent of the total applicants based on data for the two immediately preceding years.
- M.**      **“Private land-only deer license”** shall mean the valid official document for hunting deer on private deeded land during designated private land-only hunts.
- N.**      **“Quality hunt”** shall mean a hunt designed to provide a hunter with an opportunity to achieve one or more of the following: an enhanced experience based on timing and length of hunt season; lower hunter density; or an increased opportunity for success.

O. "Web sale" shall refer to accessing the department's internet address to initiate the process to purchase specific deer hunting licenses as designated by the director annually.

P. "Wildlife management areas" or "WMAs" shall mean those areas as described in 19.34.5 NMAC Wildlife Management Areas.

**19.31.13.8 ADJUSTMENT OF LICENSES, PERMITS AND AUTHORIZATIONS:** The director, with the verbal concurrence of the chairperson or their designee, may adjust the number of licenses, permits, or authorizations for deer up or down by no more than twenty percent of the total licenses available in the GMU to address significant changes in population levels or to address critical department management needs. This adjustment may be applied to any or all of the specific hunt codes for deer. The director may change or cancel all hunts on military lands to accommodate closures on those lands; if changed, the season length and bag limit shall remain the same as assigned on the original hunt code.

B. GMU 2A, 2B, 2C, 4 and 5A landowners are required to provide proof of land ownership to obtain special application forms from the department.

C. For GMU 5A, the department may use input from landowners to develop a process to distribute special application forms to private landowners that provides reasonable and equitable participation opportunities for landowners.

D. When applying for private land hunts in GMU 5A, no more than one person may apply on each application form.

**19.31.13.10 CHRONIC WASTING DISEASE:** The director has the authority to designate possession criteria to any deer hunter where chronic wasting disease (CWD) is a concern. A. meat that is cut and wrapped (either commercially or privately);

B. quarters or other portions of meat with no part of the spinal column or head attached;

D. hides with no heads attached;

E. clean skull plates with antlers attached; clean is defined as having been immersed in a bath of at least one part chlorine bleach and two parts water with no meat or tissue attached;

F. antlers with no meat or tissue attached;

G. finished taxidermied heads;

H. or by prior arrangement to a department office.

**19.31.13.12 SPECIAL DEER HUNTING OPPORTUNITIES:**

**A. Deer enhancement program:**

(1) **Program description:** The director of the department shall collect all proceeds generated through the auction and lottery of special deer permits, and such monies shall be deposited in the game protection fund. These monies shall be made available for expenditure by the department solely for programs and projects to benefit deer and for direct costs incurred in carrying out these programs. These monies shall be used to augment, and not replace, monies appropriated from existing funds available to the department for the conservation, restoration, utilization and management of deer.

(2) **Requirements for issuance of special deer permits:**

(a) The state game commission shall authorize the director of the department to issue not more than two special deer permits in any one license year to take one fork antlered deer per permit. The director shall allow the sale of one permit through auction to the highest bidder and one permit to a person selected through a random drawing of a lottery ticket by the department or an incorporated, nonprofit organization dedicated to the conservation of deer.

(b) Unless their hunting privileges have been revoked pursuant to law, any person is eligible to submit a bid for the special deer auction permit or purchase lottery tickets in an attempt to be selected for the special deer lottery permit.

(c) The special deer permits issued through auction and lottery may be transferred through sale, barter or gift by the successful individuals to only other individuals qualified to hunt.

(3) **Enhancement hunts:** Deer enhancement licenses shall be valid from September 1 through January 31, for any legal sporting arms. These licenses shall be valid statewide where hunting is allowed. The bag limit shall be one fork antlered deer. The authorization to obtain a deer enhancement license may be used either by the applicant or any individual.

**B. Deer incentive programs:**

(1) **Chronic wasting disease (CWD) reporting incentive:** The director may annually allow up to two deer authorizations to be issued through a random drawing for deer and elk hunters submitting their legally harvested animal for CWD testing. Authorizations awarded pursuant to this rule may be transferred through sale, barter or gift. Deer incentive hunts shall be valid only for the dates, legal sporting arms, bag limit and area specified by the director.

(2) **Private land deer incentive program:** Private landowners who are conducting and maintaining substantial habitat improvements or land management practices on their deeded lands that directly and significantly benefit deer may be considered for special recognition. Only those projects as determined by the department to be relevant and beneficial to deer will be considered. Landowners must submit an application and once approved, develop a deer conservation and management plan in cooperation with the department. Upon approval of the plan the landowner may be granted alternative season dates as approved by the department. Landowners receiving incentive authorizations are required to submit an update as directed by the department to be considered for continued participation. The hunt code for any unique hunt season approved pursuant to this program shall be DER-1-600.

**C. Premium hunt opportunity:** One premium deer draw hunt will be issued each license year through the draw. The hunt area will be statewide on any public land open to hunting, including WMAs, and private land with written permission.

**19.31.13.13 POPULATION MANAGEMENT HUNTS:**

**A.** The director or their designee may authorize population management hunts for deer when justified in writing by department personnel.

**B.** The director or their designee shall designate the legal sporting arms, season dates, season lengths, bag limits, hunt boundaries, specific requirements or restrictions, and number of licenses to be issued.

**C.** In the event that an applicant is not able to hunt on the dates specified, the applicant's name shall be moved to the bottom of the list and another applicant may be contacted for the hunt.

**D.** In those instances where a population management hunt is warranted on deeded private lands, the landowner may suggest eligible hunters of their choice by submitting a list of prospective hunters' names to the

department for licensing consideration. No more than one-half of the total number of licenses authorized shall be available to landowner identified hunters. The balance of prospective hunters shall be identified by the department. [19.31.13.14 NMAC - Rp, 19.31.13.13 NMAC, 4-1-19]

**19.31.13.14 DEER HUNTS:**

A. Public draw (and private lands in GMUs 2A, 2B, 2C, 4 and 5A) deer hunts, listing the open GMUs or areas, eligibility requirements or restrictions, hunt dates, hunt codes, legal sporting arms, number of licenses and bag limit shall be as indicated below. The state game commission owned prairie-chicken areas shall be open for deer hunting during established seasons. Hunters holding a valid bow deer license for GMUs 23 or 24 who did not harvest a deer during their hunt will be allowed to hunt for antlerless deer within the Silver City deer management area as delineated by the department from January 16 through February 5.

**B. Private land-only deer hunts:** Private land-only deer licenses shall be restricted to the hunt dates, eligibility requirements or restrictions, legal sporting arms and bag limit that corresponds to the draw hunt code listed in Subsection A of 19.31.13.14 NMAC for the GMU where the private landowner's property lies. Private land-only deer licenses shall be unlimited and available from any license vendor and the department's web site. 



Archery season is divided into a separate September and a separate January season when a split September and/or January season currently exists. Several new hunting opportunities have been created, including additional archery hunts in the Northeast and Northwest Areas. Most youth hunts are standardized to a 9-day hunt surrounding Thanksgiving week. ## Technical Information for Deer Rule Development



New Mexico Department of Game and Fish (Department) manages for a variety of deer hunting opportunities and harvest strategies throughout the state. Hunt structure in some Game Management Units (GMUs) are designed to provide an opportunity to hunt deer and potentially harvest a buck regardless of age class or size. These are defined as “standard” or “opportunity” hunts. Hunts in other GMUs are designed to provide a “quality” hunting experience meaning they are managed to provide an opportunity for one or more of the following: an enhanced experience based on timing and length of hunt season, lower hunter density, or an increased opportunity for success. Special circumstances, such as high deer densities in close proximity to human populations, may result in the Department altering objectives for a localized area within a GMU or for an entire GMU.

The Department conducts annual post-hunt surveys to obtain herd composition estimates (buck:doe and fawn:doe ratios; Appendix 1) and estimate deer density on the landscape. Long-term survey datasets exist for some GMUs but it is inconsistent for other GMUs. Where survey data is strong and consistent, more emphasis was placed on the survey data when making recommendations. In GMUs where survey data is inconsistent, the Department based recommendations on harvest trends and expert knowledge of the population.

### **Guidelines and License Allocations**

Guidelines were developed for each fee type (“Standard” and “Quality”, Table 1). These guidelines were compared with harvest and success rate trends for each GMU (Appendix 2) when adjusting licenses for the 2019-2022 rule cycle. Harvest for all hunts of a specified weapon type within a GMU was considered and licenses were adjusted accordingly. In some instances, trends for a particular hunt or GMU were inconsistent. When this occurred, recommendations were made based on what the majority of the trends suggested. License numbers for a given hunt should be in multiples of 5. If a current hunt was not a multiple of 5, license numbers were rounded to the nearest 5 multiple.

#### **Opportunity Hunt Units**

Opportunity hunts (also defined as Standard Hunts) are designed to provide applicants with a higher chance of drawing a deer hunting license. These units are managed to maximize annual hunter opportunity without negative impacts to overall population health. Hunting opportunities in these units range from slightly restrictive to nonrestrictive depending on deer population trends.

GMUs in opportunity hunt units are managed to maintain a post-hunt buck to doe ratio (B:D) of at least 15 bucks:100 does. The age class of bucks in opportunity units will typically be younger than that in Quality units. Hunter density in these areas will typically be higher and success rates may be lower as a result.

Some GMUs are listed as Standard Hunt but hunter numbers, success rates, and satisfaction are consistently high. However, landscape attributes or accessible public lands may not allow for an increase in hunter numbers.

### Quality Hunt Units

Quality hunts are designed to provide hunters with some combination of lower hunter density per hunt, an increased opportunity for success, an ability to select from a wider selection of legal animals, and/or season structures (timing and length) that provide a more pleasurable hunting experience. Quality hunts are designated by the State Game Commission and license availability is restrictive.

Quality hunt units are managed to maintain a post-hunt B:D ratio of at least 30 bucks:100 does. Because of a higher B:D ratio, the average age of harvested bucks in Quality units will typically be older. Hunter density is managed to approximately 0.1-0.3 hunters per square mile. However, there are instances where a unique Quality hunting opportunity results in greater hunter density (e.g., the Sugarite State Park archery hunt in November). These instances will be evaluated on a case by case basis.

Quality Hunt Units are designated for all or a portion of hunts in GMUs: 2B, 2C, 4, 5B, 17, 23, 27, 33, 41, the Valle Vidal, and Sugarite Canyon State Park.

### White-tailed Deer

License allocation recommendations for Coues white-tailed deer (found in the southwestern part of New Mexico) were made with emphasis on hunter satisfaction and supplemented with local population knowledge.

Success rates for Texas white-tailed deer in the eastern portion of the state are consistently low. These hunts provide hunters with an opportunity to go afield on a more consistent basis. Because these hunts provide an opportunity with very minimal impact to the white-tailed deer population, few adjustments were made to license numbers for white-tailed deer in eastern New Mexico.

Examples include areas of high disease risk (i.e. CWD), areas where social tolerance of deer is low, areas where the hunting public desires greater opportunity to hunt or harvest a buck, etc.


My proposal is that the applicant would submit for three desired units, with the Game and Fish Department making the decision on which unit would be awarded and the license would be paid for by the applicant.

On August 20, 2016, I received a response by Stewart Liley, Chief Wildlife Management Division, State of NM, Department of Game and Fish, with the following information: "Every four years the Department presents to the State Game Commission changes to deer rule that take into consideration all relevant biological information as well as information gathered from public comments, such as the one outlined in your letter. Presently we are at the midpoint of the four year rule cycle for deer with the Commission scheduled to hear initial recommendation for the next deer rule in the Spring of 2018. The Department will ensure to keep your letter as part of the public comments for the next Rule development, but we strongly encourage you to remain engaged on this topic and provide additional public comment to the Commission during the next Deer Rule development."

Since Spring 2018 is only months away, I am determined to stay engaged on this proposal. Developing a Senior Hunt would be a feather in your hat.

I would certainly like to hear from some or all concerned with this matter.

Hope you are well.

I am writing to offer a proposal of splitting Unit 7 into subunits. The reason is the abuse that is taking place and to spread hunters out within this huge unit and of course the selling language of "we would like to provide more hunter opportunity to the publics😊"

It is my opinion that there are lots of folks buying private land tags and hunting wherever they want. I have talked to Stewart about getting a simple one line addition to the harvest survey requiring those that hunt a private deer tag be required to indicate the ranch they hunted and be subject to some form of penalty in the event of fraud. In my opinion, 7 has all the makings of a 2C and needs to be managed similar to 2C.

I have attached a map providing input where it should be split. Basically take a straight south line from the SW corner of the Jic to the Continental Divide, then follow the divide to its junction with unit 9.

Other Items:

DEER: I would also like to propose a handful of MI Hunt Only be offered for mule deer. Not sure where, but we have them for elk, antelope, and Oryx. Why mule deer have been excluded escapes me.

Is there a way to look at the limits of landowner deer authorizations in Unit 2 whereby a ranch over 640 total acres receives a minimum of one (1) authorization per weapon type instead of the current method?

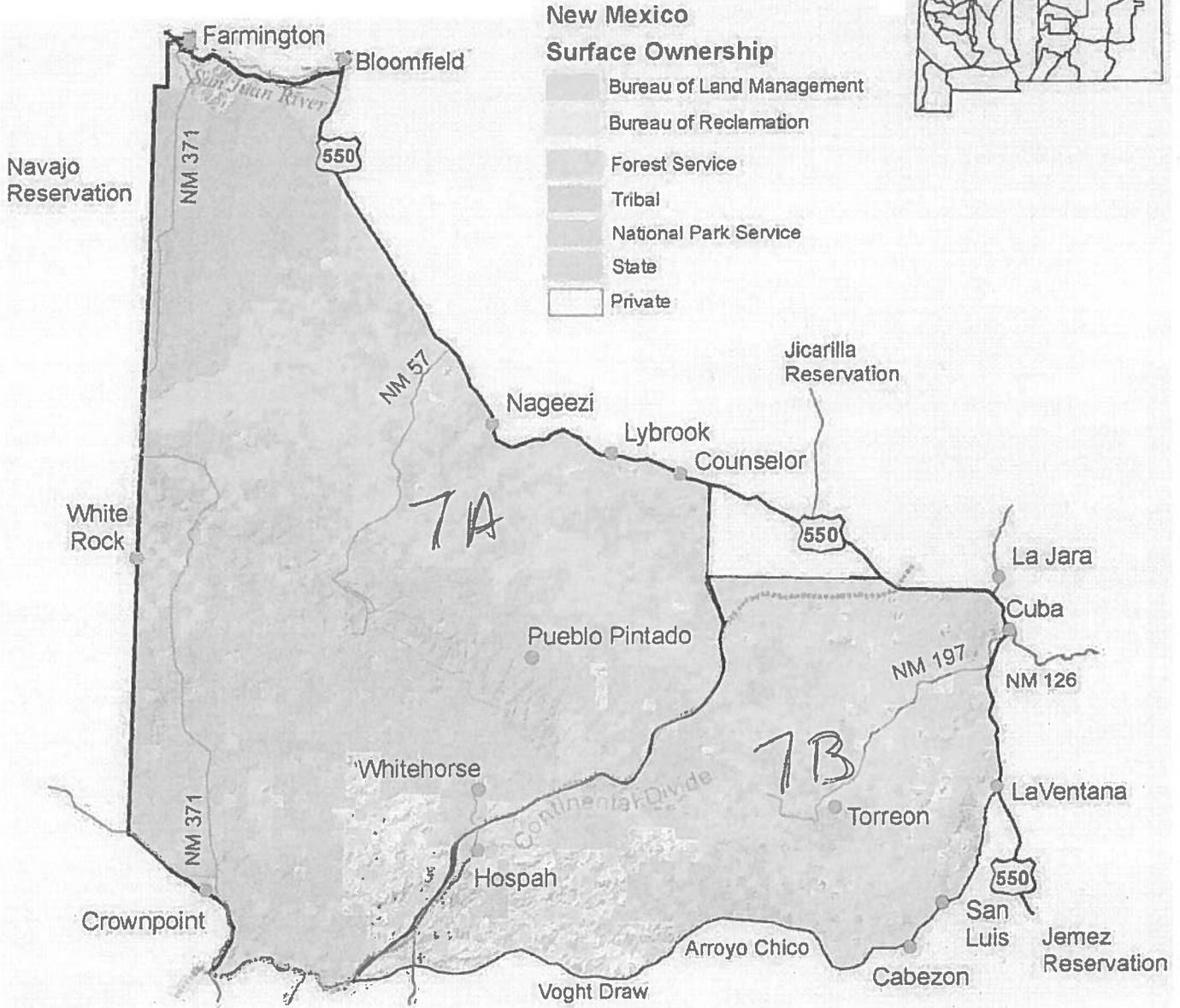

Dear New Mexico Game and Fish,

I am Ray Milligan a private land outfitter here in **Unit 4** for the past 32 seasons. Additionally I have served on the Board of Directors for the New Mexico Council of Outfitters and Guides for the past 16 years.

I would like to make some suggestions pertaining to **Private Land hunts**, for the upcoming four year seasons. So I will get straight to it.

- 1) It would be beneficial to change the rifle hunts bag limit from Mature Bull to a Mature Bull/Anterless tag. Most of my clients like to bring home elk meat and currently they have to shoot a small bull in order to complete that objective if we cannot find a larger bull. In conversations with other outfitters here in Unit 4 we all agree that we could save many young bulls to put some age on if our clients could take a cow towards the end of the hunt rather than a small bull.
- 2) Currently the private land bow hunts have been lumped together with the public land's stratified seasons- 2 hunts. This change forced the private land outfitters to hunt the same amount of clients in 3 bow hunt rather the traditional 4- five day hunts we did previously. Thus we had to put more hunters in our camps and in some cases giving our clients a lesser experience. I request that the private land areas get one elk bow season from September 1-24<sup>th</sup> (just like the Deer bow hunts) to give us more flexibility and offer a better experience to our hunters.
- 3) I believe the Deer seasons for Bow and Muzzleloader are fine. As for the Rifle Deer I would like to see these 2- 5 days seasons changed to permanent dates. The first hunt would begin last Saturday in October and the second hunt would start on the first Saturday in November. From living here in the Chama valley for 30 years I know that the biological migration of deer occurs around the 25<sup>th</sup> of October and the peak of the Rut is in the first week of December. These dates while not in the rut would give us better deer hunts for our clients as we would get the benefit of the biological migration and possibly a little pre-rut hunting. That's my 2 cents, please consider these valid changes - Thanks

General comment:

Deer information ( population numbers, population objectives, desired sex/age ratios, surveyed sex/age ratios should be available on website under big game information, elk and deer are only species with no information)

I support splitting archery hunts into early and late hunts with different hunt codes if an additional 10% license increase is added to the early hunt. Would increase opportunity for more hunters to participate.

I oppose splitting units 31 and 32. Regulations need to be simplified not micro-managed. No biological justification given at meeting or in proposal.

I support consolidating the youth hunt into the 9 day period around Thanksgiving. This was proposed last 4 year cycle and defeated due to concerns about family holiday plans.

I recommend standardizing statewide muzzler loader hunts last week of September. Current regulations are all over the map on this hunt. Concerns over elk survey overlap are not sufficient to justify other time frame. Threats to Department personnel need to be referred to law enforcement for action.

I support the creation of a WSMR hunt. Last hunts in early 90's on WSMR were some of best in state.

I support the Department's recommendations for unit 23.

I recommend creating whitetail only hunts in all units with whitetail sub-species. Arizona does this and is able to issue approximately 6,000 more deer tags with the same estimated deer population as New Mexico. Continue to limit hunters to one deer tag per year, not one for each species.

I support adding the Sargent WMA into the hunt codes with the Humphries and Rio Chama WMA's. I mapped the habitat for the Department on those WMAs in the 80's and the Sargent should never have been closed to deer hunting.

I recommend setting threshold buck/doe and fawn/doe rations to trigger January late archery hunts. Issue is not whether does are bred but increased harassment of adult deer already under breeding stress during a stressful time of year. Multiple published research studies have shown main issue for New Mexico deer is malnutrition. Additional harassment at this time of year only exacerbates this issue.

To Whom It May Concern:

This letter is in regards to the recently announced proposed changes to the deer, elk and the elk private lands use system (E-PLUS) across the state, including the proposal to split the deer archery season into two distinct seasons, adjusting licenses, adding new hunts, increasing elk harvest in some areas, and establishing different criteria to administer the E-PLUS system.

The Chama Peak Land Alliance is a diverse group of conservation-minded landowners committed to embracing and practicing responsible land, water and wildlife stewardship in southern Colorado and northern New Mexico for the benefit of our tri-cultural heritage and for generations to come. In northern New Mexico, the private landowners represented by the Alliance own and manage ecologically important private lands, including primary migration corridors for mule deer and elk from high elevation summer ranges to lower elevation winter habitats. These landowners are invested in practicing good land and wildlife management to ensure the long-term viability of deer and elk populations in this landscape, as well as overall ecosystem health. Additionally, our rural communities are dependent on the tourism and hunting economy supported by healthy wildlife populations.

We would like to offer the following comments regarding the changes proposed by the New Mexico Department of Game and Fish:

- 1) It is unnecessary to split the archery season into two distinct seasons. Instead, landowners should be allowed to hunt the entire archery season from Sept. 1-24. We seek no increase in available licenses for private lands, but simply the option to hunt the full season.
- 2) Provide either sex archery tags for elk on private land to reduce the number of bulls harvested solely for meat. Cow harvest objectives could remain the same, with proper monitoring to prevent over-harvest, or reduced proportionally.

- 3) In theory we support the distribution of authorizations to those private properties that can show meaningful benefit. However, we acknowledge the difficulty the Department is likely to face in implementation of this rule due to lack of funding and manpower, as well as the difficulty inherent in defining “meaningful benefit” and determining the process by which such benefit is recognized. If an accurate and implementable process could be established we recommend that the authorizations removed from those properties that cannot show benefit be reallocated to the properties that provide the greatest benefit to wildlife regardless of size.
- 4) Unconverted authorizations should not be reallocated. Each landowner should be afforded the right to make harvest decisions on their own property and set objectives. The department has pushed the idea that all landowners have the ability to effectively manage the elk herd through their use, or non-use, of their elk tags. Additionally, landowners should not be pressured into converting the authorizations; pressure that results from the current system reallocating unconverted authorizations the following year to random landowners. Redistributing unconverted authorizations takes control away from landowners and contributes to chronic over-harvest.
- 5) We support Department actions to encourage harvest of older age class bulls. Point restrictions have worked well in the past, however this action alone is unlikely to achieve harvest objectives without a concurrent decrease in the overall bull harvest. Unit 4 was designated as an “opportunity” elk hunt in the past based solely on high bull harvest levels. We recommend that this unit be re-designated as a “quality” unit, which would trigger a decrease in bull tags and an emphasis on harvesting older age class bulls.
- 6) We believe the current E-PLUS season is too long and begins during the peak of the rut when bulls are most vulnerable. We propose a shorter two-month season from October 5<sup>th</sup> to December 1<sup>st</sup>, which would allow some bulls to escape harvest at the start and end of the rut. Public land rifle bull hunts do not start as early as the current E-PLUS season, for exactly this purpose. We believe that two months of bull elk hunting is sufficient to satisfy hunter demand while also protecting the elk resource.
- 7) We do not support the over-the-counter sale of elk tags outside the COER areas. The definition of COER is not sufficiently precise; issuing over-the-counter sales for these areas could result in the severe reduction or outright loss of some elk populations and restrict herd expansion in those areas. We do not support maximizing license sales at the expense of these populations.
- 8) We fully support the call for habitat based evaluations in the E-PLUS system, however the details of such evaluations must be disclosed. Such an initiative must also receive specific and sufficient funding in order to be implemented properly; we do not support simply adding such evaluations to the responsibilities of existing and already busy staff.

We appreciate the opportunity to submit comments on the Department’s proposed changes to the deer, elk and the elk private lands use system (E-PLUS) across the state. Our Board, staff, and members are deeply committed to working with each other, our communities, and our agency partners to practice and promote responsible land and wildlife management in New Mexico.

I recommend creating a new "species" hunt for white tail deer. Instead of having just one species (deer), you have two species that you can apply for. Potentially you could draw a mule deer license and a white tail deer license. This would create potential for more revenue by allowing for two separate application fees and two separate license fees.

I don't want to see GMU 32 split into two units. The unit allows for hunters to spread out if certain areas get too concentrated with hunters. It also allows for the option of hunting several different habitat types during the hunt.

I also don't want to see a split in the archery hunts between September and January. Especially in the southern part of the state. Most southern hunters use the September time frame as an opportunity to get out hunt if they do not draw anything else. But most would rather hunt in January. If you do split the hunts, the September hunts will go largely under-subscribed (especially in the southern part of the state).

### Deer Rule:

First of all, I would like to see whitetail deer and mule deer broken out between species, since they are recognized as two different species. Currently you can only possess one deer license a year. I would love the opportunity to possess a mule deer and whitetail deer license in the same license year. Whitetails are difficult to harvest and would provide another opportunity. Whitetail hunters in general are a specific niche willing to attempt to harvest whitetails. I tend to compare Mule deer to rainbow trout that a majority of fisherman are able to catch, and whitetail are like brown trout that require certain specialized technique and individual willing to put the time in to catch one.

I do not support splitting the September and January deer hunts, again. I think they should remain all bow hunts are valid for September and January. Primarily all southern hunts are hot is September, but it affords the opportunity for a combo hunt along with an elk tag if you are fortunate enough to draw both in the same unit. If successful with elk in a different unit it allows the opportunity to focus on elk in September and deer in January. Since there is no guaranteed combo hunts it allows the hunter to participate in both if in different units since they are both in the same time frame.

I remember when the hunts were split there was always leftover tags in September even in quality units like 17. If a hunt can support both September and January it should be one offered under one hunt code. There was a lot of talk at the public meeting in Las Cruces to provide more opportunities such as January hunts in the north. If it can sustain the pressure I support that but would be interested in a hunt code the covers both months rather than two different hunt codes. In most units especially up north with the weather deer are found in different areas in January than they are in September. I don't buy the provide a quality hunt by having less hunters. My personal quality of hunt comes from which units I choose to hunt. A unit with low deer numbers is only going to reach a certain quality by the resources (deer) available. Not every unit can be a quality hunt, some units are opportunity units which means you are going to have to work to find a deer that you are willing to harvest.

I understand there was concern from the biologist with the northern hunts and unlimited over the counter tags harming the migrating herds that can be argued either way. Either the private land hunters overharvest or the private land hunters understand the value of wildlife and limit their harvest. I would support it if all units that could support it September and January and the northern units that are of concern are September only.

Dear Sir / Mam:

For over the past 50+ years I have been an avid outdoorsman. I started hunting and fishing back when the majority of all licenses were over the counter. I do understand that times have changed and more and more people are applying for Elk and Deer tags along with the commercialization of hunting via Outfitters and Landowners. I have faithfully put in every year for Elk and Deer and have been unsuccessful. I have a few suggestions for the New Mexico Department of Game and Fish to consider.

First, it is time for New Mexico to update it's drawing system by implementing a preference point system. The majority of all states do this.

Secondly, now that professional outfitters have come on board, in significant numbers, to capitalize on New Mexico's wildlife populations, which is maintained at the cost of all New Mexico taxpayers, an additional tax or surcharge should be charged to all outfitters, which they can pass on to their clients, so that they help carry more of that burden (i.e. Something similar to the New Mexico Gross Receipts Tax). This money would go directly to the NM Department of Game and Fish.

Third, the majority of landowners in New Mexico, due to the farming and ranching property reduced tax basis, do not have to pay their fair share in property taxes. However, they too reap the benefits at the cost of all New Mexico taxpayers by being allowed to sell landowner tags. If they want to sell landowner tags that's fine, however, they should be assessed an additional tax if they elect to sell their tags. This money would also go directly to the NM Department of Game and Fish.

Fourth, since it has become almost impossible to draw a New Mexico elk tag I have resorted to applying for out of state licensed in Colorado and Wyoming. **They both have preference point systems.** I particularly like Wyoming's system. In a nutshell they have various draw pools and if an applicant is willing to pay more to get into a better pool he or she can do so. You may want to consider something similar for both in state and out of state applicants whom are willing to pay extra to be placed into another drawing pool with better drawing odds. One negative comment people make about having various pools is that it is not fair to those who cannot afford to pay into a higher pool. However, this is already occurring due to outfitter tag allocations and landowner tax allocations those same people cannot afford to purchase those tags either.

Re: Proposed Changes to Rules 19.30.5, 19.31.14, and 19.31.13

I am writing this letter in regards to potential rule and practice changes the NMDGF is considering regarding tag allocation, E-PLUS, SCRs, and elk COER units. Firstly, it is my belief, and the, declared law of New Mexico and in the interest of managing wildlife within the North American Model, that the game animals of New Mexico are managed and protected for the citizenry—public and private—of New Mexico. Secondly, I believe, and am supported by federal and state law that certain designated land owned by the federal and state government are open to use by public citizens. Lastly, and most importantly, I urge the NMDGF to manage tag assignment, land use partnerships, and E-PLUS and SCR appropriations with a critical, scientific based, ecologically driven framework. Partnerships with local research organizations like New Mexico State University, The University of New Mexico, USDA, and NRCS should be considered and pursued. Proactive NMDGF management and policy could result in a New Mexico that leads the Nation in game and fish management and offers both public and private individuals and landowners world-class outdoor, hunting, fishing, and other recreational activity. Such adjustments are critically needed to ensure the sustainability of both private and public hunting in New Mexico.



The expansion of elk COER units is a positive and needed management decision that complies with scientific data and should be implemented by the NMDGF. Enlargement of COER areas will not only improve and enhance elk herd dynamics, but also enhance the public land hunter's opportunity for quality elk hunting. This is one positive agenda, for both public and private hunters, I have heard described in the last public meetings. I am in full support of elk COER unit expansion and consider it the most positive, forward thinking, conservation minded and pro-public hunter agenda item the NMDGF is openly considering. Other positives, include offering distinct tags for Couers or White Tail Deer, where they exist, increasing tag amount in unit 28 (Fort Bliss) and increased tag allotment and access to areas where herd health and population has increased. It is unfortunate and dismaying to learn of potential decreases in youth hunt allotments. I trust that the NMDGF believes in its mission and purpose and goal of such allotments. If decreases in in any tag allotment should be made, it should be based upon scientific data, not tag scarcity or, potentially, profitability. In the case of reduction of tags within units, for youth, public, or private hunts, tags awarded to private land—E-PLUS or SCR—should be cut, or cut in proportion with public land or youth tags. Additionally, the proposal to—in some units—allow over the counter elk tags is misguided. This policy may be sustainable in some units, but sets a negative and non-sustainable trend for the rest of New Mexico. The rest that I hear, or rather don't hear enough of in public meetings, is the situation with SCR and E-PLUS properties.

The public land hunter should be very concerned over how tags are allocated to and managed by private land owners. These landowners have rights and a voice in the conversation, as they should. But, in many situations, that right and the weight that landowners hold results inequitable assignment of the public's resource, game animals. Not only is there a misappropriation of tags allotted to these individuals, but also a misallocation of funds. Many of these individuals receive funds from the state the federal government and/or NMDGF for habitat improvement, but still feel that their land is private. There needs to be equity between public and private hunters. Not only is there an inequitable allocation of tags available to land owners in some units, but in all cases, private land hunters are able to hunt before any public land hunter. If a private land authorization allows for a hunter to pursue bull elk during the rut, IE, October 1<sup>st</sup> with a rifle. How can the NMDGF in good conscious say that it is acceptable to manage public draw hunters to only hunt with a rifle beginning in the middle of October? If the NMDGF believes that harvest rates would be too high if public draw hunters were allowed to hunt the peak of the rut with firearms, why are they allowing private land authorizations during this time frame? The elk are not easily persuaded by fences. Inside the COER elk move outside the COER. That is dispersion. A basic biological principal that your management proposals are blatantly disregarding. Hunting seasons should, and must, be uniform between public and private land hunters. The location and coordinates of private landowners that enroll in these programs should be available to the public. If NMDGF has visited and coordinated with these properties to receive public benefit, the public hunter should be able to have the access and knowledge of where or where not they can hunt. If a private land owner enters an agreement with the NMDGF they must comply by said agreement. At current, there are few and far between ways the NMDGF can ensure those private lands are complying with conditions and near to no ways for citizens to report non-compliance.

In that vein, NMDGF should be more discerning when it comes to assigning and approving SCR and E-PLUS lands and tags. I take issue with how many tags are allotted to E-PLUS and SCR lands and the unfair allowances those landowners receive. The boundaries and locations of these private lands that public land hunters are allowed to enter and cross through—via agreements made with the NMDGF—are not made public. In some units, private tags outnumber public tags 3 to 1. In some cases, landowners with as little as 100 acres through the E-PLUS program receive multiple tags per year. Other, much larger ranches, receive far more tags.

In many cases they should. The profitability of game tags has become a needed crutch to many New Mexico ranchers and private landowners. Although this crutch may be needed for those individuals, and the allotment and sale of those may benefit the local economy, policy should not be directed to subsidize these individuals. Instead, there must be a balance to private—E-PLUS and SCR—and public land tag allotments—in and outside COER units. In return of the benefit of receiving sustained and recurring tag allotments—along with potential other land and improvements subsidized or enhanced by the NMDGF, private-and-tag-holders should be held account for 1) access to their land if originally agreed upon area 2) the same hunting season as public land hunters and 3) proactive, sustained, and scientifically recommended land use practices. I have addressed some issues with points 1 and 2 above; point three is just as important.

Through mandate, the NMDGF, BLM, DOI and other organizations utilize a large amount of public—and in the case of the NMDGF sportsman's—money to manage and care for public resources. Private landowners that receive benefits from the state—tag allocations, land or habitat improvements—should be encouraged and required to manage their land in a way that maintains, supports, and enhances the public resource they are benefiting from. In a way, tags allotted to private landowners are lands and tags allotted in public trust that they will be managed correctly for the collective good. Additionally, using such criteria to assign E-PLUS or SCR tags could weed out private land owners blatantly using minor land ownership as a way to accrue tags.

Without any type of access for us it's only going to benefit the private land owner. It will ultimately pile more hunters in the few accessable public lands available. This unit in particular has become a perfect example of landowner welfare. I CAN NOT STRESS ENOUGH THAT THE LANDOWNERS ENROLLED IN UW TAGS NEED TO BE HELD ACCOUNTABLE DOR ANSWERING AND RETURNING PHONE CALLS TO THE PUBLIC. I am an avid hunter , outdoors man ,and guide in New Mexico. I appreciate this opportunity to have my input heard ( if this email gets read). It's my understanding that there is an idea on the table to invent a 65+ hunt by cutting into youth tags. I feel that this is a good idea to give older people the opportunity to apply for these special hunts, but not at the expense of youth tags. These tags should be pulled from the UNIT WIDE land owner tags. Which brings me to my next topic.

- In order for landowners to be eligible for tags through the E-plus system there should be a minimum number of acres to contribute to be granted tags.

Example- ( One of many) a lot of 40 private acres in 16b is given a unit wide trophy bull tag, which sells for \$15,000. In no way do properties like that benefit the public land hunter.

- All landowners given UW tags need to provide gps coordinates to any properties enrolled in the program. Simply list them on the same page the landowner list is posted.
- Landowners now mostly provide a p.o. box instead of physical address along with a phone number. In 20 years I've made hundreds of calls to these numbers listed and have never got a call returned. They simply do NOT hold up their end of the bargain. Making it almost impossible to find the land. There need to be consequences for this.
- Maps for unit wide ranches are simply unacceptable and need be updated and made more clear with gps coordinates right on the map. Hunters should be able to easily access these on the website FOR FREE!
- Landowners are taking it upon themselves to post PUBLIC land as private, and decommissioning roads in the process. They need to be held accountable for these actions. Public land hunters have enough trouble accessing public land as it is.
- Hunt dates on Ranch Only tags can begin as early as October 1 for rifle hunts. I believe that is one of the most crucial times for the elk herds breeding season and was the reason the public land hunter has to wait until the middle of month to rifle hunt. These rules should also apply to private land elk hunters.
- Altercations with landowners not uncommon. I've personally had them lie to me about which ranch I was on to try and convince me to leave so their hunters who paid the premium can be undisturbed. They should be penalized for harassment for conducting themselves in such a way.

Overall the system has evolved into a huge payday for landowners. I understand they should be compensated for the animals using their property as habitat, at the same time they should be forced to uphold their duties to confirm location of the properties enrolled. No one is forcing them to sign up, but they should be forced to make it CRYSTAL CLEAR where their unit wide properties are for those who are interested in hunting them . Landowners should NOT get away with falsely post public properties as private, and blocking access roads either.

This email is presented to you on behalf of the Mule Deer Foundation, 10 New Mexico MDF Chapters and over 1,000 MDF members across the state. The comments below are feedback I have received on behalf of our members and submitted to you to review in the rule making process. The new deer rule proposed changes provide several good opportunities for resident and non-resident hunters in New Mexico. Several changes we are in support of but several we would like to make suggestions to the proposal. Supported changes of the rule and our suggested changes are listed below.

### Supported changes:

- In support of Allowing Burro Archery hunters who are unsuccessful on their hunt to harvest a deer on the depredation hunt in the Silver City management zone
- In support of Combining the November youth hunt into a 9 day consecutive hunt
- In support of the Decreased tags in the SW area
- In Support of the increased whitetail hunts in the NE area of the state and making them ES
- In support of the Jan/Sept Archery hunt split
- In support of unit 19 WSMR Hunt opportunity
- In Support of Valle Vidal and Colin Neblett September Archery deer hunt

### Suggested changes to the Rule Proposal:

- Strongly opposed to the unit 2b/2c increase.
  - If this increase is needed, we suggest the increased tags be offered as a Management hunt only. These units have several older age class bucks that do not meet trophy quality and need to be culled to allow for larger trophy class bucks ability to breed does. This management hunt can take place mid to late October and be offered to youth or residents only.
- Strongly oppose increasing deer tags in unit 30 and 31
  - However we are in support of splitting the unit 30 rifle hunt into 2 hunt dates, preferably with less hunters across the landscape
- Suggested change or modification to the current Harvest Reporting questions to include more biological data gathered. IE: #antler points on each side, #of deer observed, #of bucks observed # of does observed, etc.
- Suggested information to include when making decisions on tag number changes is the amount of deer poached in the area of change. Poaching continues to be a problem across the state but that harvest number is not calculated into the formula when altering tag numbers in a given unit.

Dear Game Dept.,

Having lived here in unit 23 for almost 45 years our mule deer herds are in terrible shape. The proposed 13% decrease in tags is not nearly enough to turn around our low buck doe ratio. Most hunters whom hunt unit 23 either see no bucks or very few. We just do not have the bucks and enough of a robust deer herd to support the heavy hunting pressure. Unit 23 has been an opportunity unit for many years but if there are only a minimal amount of bucks to hunt it becomes a poor opportunity hunt. Coyotes take a huge toll on our fawn crop so our recruitment is very low also.

Coues Whitetail deer numbers have fallen dramatically in much of the heavier hunted parts of unit 23 along the San Francisco River Canyon. It has had extremely heavy hunting pressure the last several years and the quality of the hunts have dramatically declined irregardless of what your statistics tell you. You can hunt from the old Kenneth Hollimon Cow Camp down along Goat Basin and where we used to see multiple bucks and many does every time, you will be lucky to see one or two does now. That whole area including Table Top, Pine Canyon and Lightening Mesa have only a fraction of Coues whitetail deer it used to have.



Unit 23 has taken a beating the last many years for both our Mule Deer and Coues Deer and for the Dept. to continually ignore the truly horrible hunting for both species is a crying shame.

Other parts of the state seem to be turning around and have healthy deer herds. Why can't we make this once deer hunting area of choice, good again? Opportunity and demand seem to be the main driver of the Game Dept. management. It is time to take care of our Mulies and Coues deer here in what used to be one of the greatest deer hunting areas in the state and the Southwest.

As many of you in the Game Dept. know I have lived here and hunted unit 23 for 45 years and spend a considerable amount of time in this unit and am not just blowing smoke at you. Our deer numbers don't justify the 2250 tags less 13%. I would bet good money that that number will not turn around the terrible shape both the mulie herds are in and the Coues numbers need to be cut also. Since the drawing separate for Coues all of the AZ hotshot Coues hunters are coming to NM and have put tremendous pressure on our Coues.

I am a New Mexico resident and have been for 51 years. I started archery hunting in Game Unit 34 in 1987. I can recall bow hunting for deer in New Mexico when Elk tags were automatic draw. If a hunter put in for the elk tag for September he could hunt for either sex for 20 some days of the elk hunt! A hunter could also hunt deer and harvest a buck or doe during that time (September or January). I attended the Las Cruces meeting and the biologist that gave the spill on deer archery secession was incorrect when he said that's they way the deer archery season was 10 years ago. Not in Game Unit 34.

1). I would recommend leaving the deer archery session the way it is. We have tried to hunt deer archery in September but its almost impossible when everyone that is not hunting is riding ATV's in the Lincoln National Forrest during Labor Day weekend. We also have the opening day of small game and people are randomly firing rifles during the elk/deer archery season in September. 24 public comment portion of the hearing. Final Commission action, including adoption  
25 of the rules, may occur after the conclusion of the presentation and public comment

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1 period of each hearing. And with that, I think we are ready for the informational  
2 portion of Hearing Item No. 1 which is Rule Making Hearing on Final Rule Changes  
3 to the Deer Rule 19.31.13 NMAC for the 2019-2023 seasons. I declare hunting  
4 season open - - no, this hearing is now open. Pardon me. Are there any exhibits for  
5 proposed new rule to 19.31.13 for the record?

6 STEWART LILEY: Mr. Chairman, I wish to enter six exhibits. Exhibit No. 1 is the  
7 notice of the rule making. Exhibit No. 2 is the initial proposed rule. Exhibit No.3 is the  
8 presentation as being given today. Exhibit No. 4 is the summary of the proposed  
9 changes. Exhibit 5 is the technical information that we relied upon to develop the  
10 rule, and Exhibit No.6 is the 57 public comments we received during the comment  
11 period.

12 CHAIRMAN KIENZLE: And what's the total number?

13 STEWART LILEY: Six exhibits.

14 CHAIRMAN KIENZLE: Six. I will admit Exhibits 1 through 6 into the record. And this  
15 includes public comment?

16 STEWART LILEY: Mr. Chairman, that is correct. Public comment is on the CD at the  
17 back.

18 CHAIRMAN KIENZLE: Okay. You can go ahead and introduce the rule.

19 STEWART LILEY: Mr. Chairman, as stated, this is the informational portion for the  
20 Deer Rule. The Deer Rule set to expire in March. We had four public meetings,  
21 specifically for the Deer Rule, and then 72 attendees. So fairly well attended. Fifty-  
22 seven written and/or emailed comments. Most of the comments pertaining to license  
23 adjustments were either up or down, both in favor and opposed. So there was not  
24 one strong one way or the other. People in favor of our new hunts, we did as we go  
25 through the presentation, proposed some new hunts across the state. People in favor

1 of also consolidating our youth hunts around the Thanksgiving period when kids are  
2 off, so they are able to get out there and hunt and not necessarily worry about just  
3 weekend hunting. Some comments related to the split archery season, both in favor  
4 and opposed, it was kinda split across that. And then comments related to the draw  
5 process that really isn't part of the Deer Rule and then other unrelated comments is  
6 where we received -- really the majority are a lot of those comments that aren't  
7 related, necessarily, to the Deer Rule. The proposed changes is as with all these  
8 rules we are adjusting the seasons for the calendar date because they start on a  
9 Saturday. We get a day creep every single year; two days on a leap year. Addressing  
10 the license numbers based upon the biological information we've collected over the  
11 last four years and our management goals such as either trophy management or  
12 opportunity, either increasing or decreasing license numbers for those buck tags,  
13 depending on that. We did create some new hunting opportunities, as I stated, I will  
14 get through that here in a second. One of the bigger changes was separating the  
15 January and September bow seasons. Currently there's a law where you can hunt in  
16 September and/or January. Now it will be the choice of the hunter to either put in for  
17 the September hunt or the January hunt. And then again, like I said, standardizing  
18 the youth hunt, that youth deer hunt around Thanksgiving, a nine-day hunt to really  
19 give an opportunity when a lot of people are either off work, families and/or the kids  
20 are out of school for maybe a fall break. In the Northeast area, specifically, what we  
21 are proposing is allowing either sex whitetail hunting for all whitetail deer hunts.  
22 Currently, right now, we have some buck only whitetail hunts in the Northeast. That  
23 population of whitetails are growing. There's a little bit of concern of if they're growing  
24 too fast, too far and we are allowing -- we want to be able to allow some doe harvest  
25 in there or more doe harvest. The creation of some of these hunts, like I discussed,

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1 would be a new archery hunt on the Valle Vidal and the Colin Neblett to allow an  
2 opportunity there. And then created an either sex whitetail youth hunt in GMU 56;  
3 created a new archery hunt in 41, which is a January hunt, a really quality hunt,  
4 limited licenses, but it is a new hunt in there. And then we did increase licenses in  
5 some GMUs based upon the biological information that suggested increases that  
6 were warranted. Overall in the Northeast was a license increase of 9 percent. In the  
7 Southeast, specifically, we looked at splitting the rifle hunts in the Guadalupe  
8 Mountains, GMU 30, evenly. Currently they are not even. We have 640 hunts in one  
9 hunt and 960 in the other. The proposal in front of you is 800 apiece per hunt to split  
10 those evenly. GMU 31/33 is decreasing the youth hunt from two hunts to one - - or  
11 two hunts of 20 to two hunts of 10. What that is is the Department used to manage  
12 Seven Rivers in Brantley and also the Huey Wildlife Management Area. Now we just  
13 manage the Huey Wildlife Management Area. That's not to say hunters can't hunt  
14 Seven Rivers or Brantley, but we're specifically putting just that youth hunters on the  
15 Huey Management Area and that's why that reduction came about. We also are  
16 proposing moving the muzzleloader deer hunt in GMU 34 into November. We did  
17 increase licenses in the Southeast for an overall increase in 3 percent license  
18 increase overall. There were some GMUs where we did some reductions, but overall,  
19 it was a 3 percent increase. In the Southwest area, in 19, which is White Sands  
20 Missile Range, is creating a hunt on White Sands Missile Range for deer. It will be a  
21 very lifted hunt, but it would be a new hunt that was created. Then moving those off-  
22 range hunts to the first week of November. We did do some bigger license reductions  
23 in the Southwest in GMU 23. Overall, we were proposing a 13 percent reduction in  
24 licenses in the Burroughs Mountains, specifically another 13 percent on the  
25 Burroughs. And then in GMU 24 - - or excuse me 10 percent reduction. One of the

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1 other things we did in the Burrough Mountains was decrease the one illegal sporting  
2 arm weapon hunt - - or excuse me, decrease it into one, but we lengthened the hunt  
3 period to nine days, kinda more of a quality hunt experience we hope to get of that.  
4 And then we created a September whitetail, cows, deer, archery hunt. We are also  
5 allowing the Burrough hunters to hunt the Silver City Management Area. And one of  
6 the biggest things we did in the Southwest was move the January whitetail deer  
7 archery hunts from January 1 through 16, we're proposing - - or 15, excuse me. We  
8 are proposing January 16 through 31. Overall, in the Southwest when we look at  
9 increases/decreases, it is a 4 percent reduction in licenses in the Southwest with the  
10 biggest reductions occurring, again, in the Burroughs, GMU 23 and GMU 24. In the  
11 Northwest area some of the bigger ones is increase or now allowing hunters to hunt  
12 the Sargent on those deer hunts. Currently the Sargent has not been allowed to be  
13 hunted so we will be opening up the Sargent for that. Then we also created a  
14 September archery hunt for those WMAs. Currently there is not a September hunt  
15 and we'll have that. We also created a limited late November hunt; really limited  
16 opportunities, 10 licenses across all of those WMAs, but it is an opportunity when we  
17 get a lot of those deer moving. GMU 5A we created a late September muzzleloader  
18 hunt. 5B, again, we created a September archery hunt and a late September  
19 muzzleloader hunt. GMU 12, we moved that muzzleloader hunt into November so it's  
20 not overlapping with elk hunts. And GMU 14 we created a January archery hunt  
21 during that [indiscernible] period. With that, I would take any questions that you may  
22 have.

23 CHAIRMAN KIENZLE: My God man, we have to stick to the script. Give me a  
24 moment to sort things out here. We do have one item of public comment, one person  
25 who wants to do public comment, so let's take that person at this time. Chris

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1 Guikema [phonetic].

2 CHRIS GUIKEMA: Yeah, I actually had a chance to talk to Stewart afterwards so  
3 what I was going to propose is next session.

4 CHAIRMAN KIENZLE: Okay.

5 CHRIS GUIKEMA: [indiscernible] thank you.

6 CHAIRMAN KIENZLE: Failure to launch, is what will put on here or something like  
7 that. Yes, sir?

8 COMMISSIONER SALOPEK: Stewart, now that we've gone back to the September  
9 and January split of the bow hunts, did we create more opportunity by - - like, let's  
10 just pick a Unit, 16, we had 400 tags before, I didn't see exactly what you've done

11 STEWART LILEY: Mr. Chairman, Commissioner Salopek. So when we did that what  
12 we did was put more licenses in the September period. Typically, a little less success  
13 and reduce the January some. But overall, across the state, it will relate in a 10  
14 percent increase, 9.4 percent increase, in archery licenses across the state for deer  
15 in New Mexico.

16 COMMISSIONER SALOPEK: And I always look at opportunity, also. Thank you.

17 CHAIRMAN KIENZLE: Any other questions or comments? Let's see, I've got my  
18 attendance sheet. It's been signed. I will admit this into evidence, the attendance  
19 sheet and the comment card, as Exhibit No. 7. The comment submitted in testimony  
20 heard during the rule hearing will be reviewed by the Commission and discussed  
21 during open session right after I close this hearing. The Commission will vote on the  
22 proposed rule at that time. I am supposed to thank you for your participation, so  
23 thank you, I appreciate it. Let the record show that this rulemaking hearing was  
24 adjourned at 10:56 a.m. Okay, the way I like to do these instead of rolling them all up  
25 at the end, we are going to vote on them one at a time as we close the hearing. So

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1 any questions or comments from the Commissioners on the action item phase of  
2 Item No. 1, Hearing Item No. 1? Silence is deafening. Can I get a motion on this  
3 hearing item?

4 COMMISSIONER PETERSON: Mr. Chairman, I move to adopt the proposed  
5 changes to 19.31.13 NMAC as presented by the Department and allow the  
6 Department to make minor corrections to comply with filing this rule with state  
7 records and archives.

8 COMMISSIONER SALOPEK: Second.

9 CHAIRMAN KIENZLE: Any further discussion? All in favor?

10 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

11 CHAIRMAN KIENZLE: Ayes have it. Thank you. Colonel, find yourself a comfy chair,  
12 I think you're going to be here a while.

13 UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: If we're in business I'd be bringing new business.

14 CHAIRMAN KIENZLE: We have concluded Hearing Item No. 1.

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
