




#### **Restoration Goals**

• Restore and manage a viable population of approximately 100 pronghorn antelope on the Pueblo

• Sustain important wildlife species for current and future Pueblo generations

• Ensure the future practice of important traditional ceremonies on the Pueblo







### Project History:


- Sept 2007- received grant through USFWS TWGP and initiated habitat improvements
- Nov 2007- received unanimous support from New Mexico Game Commission
- Oct 2008-completed transfer agreement
- Dec 2008-trap coordination with NMDGF
- Feb 2009-assisted NMDGF in trapping effort

















#### Improvements:

- Removed 5.8 miles of non-essential fencing
- Modified 8.5 miles of fencing
- Reduced juniper density on 3,300 acres
- Initiated targeted predator control
- Adopted Santa Ana Wildlife Conservation Code
- Installed wildlife drinkers









# Monitoring

- 17 pronghorn collared (4 GPS and 13 radio)
- Causes of Mortality
- Survivorship
- Reproduction
- Habitat Use
- Dispersal





## Pueblo of Santa Ana is seeking:

• Approval from the New Mexico State Game Commission to enter agreement with Pueblo for the transfer of 40 pronghorn antelope from the State of New Mexico to the Pueblo of Santa Ana

 Approval for New Mexico Department of Game and Fish to assist with planning and capture of pronghorn antelope

#### Pueblo of Santa Ana will provide:


- Funds for trapping supplies
- Funds for helicopter support
- Funds for veterinarian support
- Staff to assist with trapping effort
- Transport of antelope from trap site to Pueblo
- Pronghorn monitoring results

#### Benefits to New Mexico:

- Provide data on pronghorn translocation
- Augment pronghorn population in Unit 8
- Restore extirpated pronghorn population
- New Mexico State-Tribal Collaboration Act
- Provide pronghorn viewing opportunities
- Offset trapping cost to New Mexico
